Through the narrative, Hawthorne suggests that human beings are not angels, but sinners, and he weaves this truth into the very setting of his story:

The founders of a new colony, whatever Utopia of human virtue and happiness they might originally project, have invariably recognized it among their earliest practical necessities to allot a portion of the virgin soil as a cemetery, and another portion as the site of a prison...Certain it is that, some fifteen or twenty years after the settlement of the town, the wooden jail was already marked with weather-stains and other indications of age which gave a yet darker aspect to its beetle-browed and gloomy front...Like all that pertains to crime, it seemed never to have known a youthful era. (Hawthorne 55)

However noble and pious the community aspired to be, it had to acknowledge its need for law and judgment; sinners must be ruled.
